




Logistics:

The University of New South Wales (UNSW) is located approximately 12km from the Sydney central business district. The Electrical Engineering building (G17) is on the main walkway of UNSW, opposite the Globe Lawn.

Public Transport

To travel to UNSW, the best mode of public transport is the light rail which should be approximately a 30 minutes journey from the city. You can tap on (at the station before embarking) and off (at the station after disembarking) using your credit card. There are multiple light rail stations in the city from which you can take the light rail to UNSW. Some of the light rail station locations in the city include Circular Quay, Bridge Street, Queen Victoria Building (QVB), Central Station and Town Hall. To travel to UNSW, you can take the light rail to either Randwick (L2 line) or Juniors Kingsford (L3 line). If you take the light rail to Randwick (L2 line) then you can disembark at UNSW High Street. Alternatively, if you take the light rail to Juniors Kingsford (L3 line) then the station to disembark is UNSW Anzac Parade. From either High street or Anzac Parade, you can walk to the Electrical Engineering building. The cost of one light rail trip from the city is approximately AUD \$5.

TRAVEL INFORMATION

Passports, Visas and Vaccinations

All travellers to Australia, other than Australian and New Zealand citizens, require a valid authority to enter Australia, either a visa or an Electronic Travel Authority (ETA). Visas are available from Australian diplomatic offices such as Australian Embassies, High Commissions and Consulates. Electronic Travel Authorities (ETAs) are issued electronically by participating travel agents connected to one of the major computer

reservation systems, from the reservation office of a participating airline or via the Australian ETA app via your appstore.

Quarantine

Australia has strict quarantine regulations regarding imported goods. Australia is free from many pests and diseases found elsewhere in the world. It is vital that you declare any food, plant or animal items upon arrival, including fresh and packaged food, fruit, eggs, meat, vegetables, seeds, animals, wood and plants. You can dispose of these items at bins found in international airports.

Quarantine regulations are strictly enforced, and penalties are very high. When you arrive in Australia, if you have any doubts about an item in your possession, declare it, and a Customs Officer will assess it. Duty free

Duty-free concessions in Australia are different to those in other countries. Most personal items such as new clothing, footwear, and articles for personal hygiene and grooming (excluding fur and perfume concentrates) may be brought into Australia in your accompanied baggage, free from duty and tax.

For other goods, limits apply. These include goods that are purchased overseas and goods that are purchased in Australia duty or tax free (that have been previously exported), or from an inwards duty-free shop on arrival into Australia. Also included are goods for which a TRS claim has been made.

TRANSPORT TO & FROM THE AIRPORT

Located in Mascot, Sydney Airport is approximately 8km from the central business district. Sydney Airport is easily accessible by all modes of transport including car, train, taxi or bus.

All terminals, T1 International, T2 Domestic and T3 Domestic, can be easily found by following signs to the airport - usually displayed by a simple aeroplane symbol. Most major routes will feature the symbol at decision points.

Taxi

Each terminal has its own sheltered taxi rank with supervisors on hand in peak hours to ensure a smooth flow of taxis for travellers. The approximate taxi fare from Sydney Airport to the City is \$50 Australian Dollars. This fare is based on non-peak traffic conditions. Passengers pay for any bridge or road tolls on top of the fare. A \$3.00 airport toll is payable by all passengers taking a taxi from any of Sydney Airport's taxi ranks.

Taxi Tips

Drivers are required to accept all fares, large and small, from the airport. The kerbside management team will help you and your driver with this request. Please note that taxis are not permitted to pick up passengers outside of the taxi ranks and the driver will be fined \$5,000 for breaking the regulation.


Train

There are rail stations located at both the International and Domestic Terminals. The Domestic rail station is located directly between T2 and T3 Terminals and is accessible from within the terminals from the arrivals level.

The International rail station is located at the northern end of the terminal and is accessible from the arrivals level. Travel by the City Airport Link is a fast and convenient way to reach the centre of Sydney.

Trains run approximately every 10 minutes and the journey into the city takes approximately 13 minutes. The International and Domestic rail stations link directly to the City Circle railway stations which means most city destinations are within a short walk of stations.

CURRENCY AND CREDIT CARDS

The basic unit of currency is the Australian Dollar. Notes come in AUD 100, AUD 50, AUD 20, AUD 10 and AUD 5 denominations. Coins come in 5c, 10c, 20c, 50c, AUD \$1 and AUD \$2 denominations.

Major credit cards such as American Express, Visa, MasterCard and Diners Club are widely accepted. ATMs (Cash points) are very commonplace throughout Australia, and generally accept a wide range of cards, including Cirrus/Maestro cards.

TAX REFUNDS

Australia has a Goods and Services Tax (GST) of 10%, which by law is always included in the displayed or marked price. For tourists buying goods in excess of \$300 as part of a single purchase, a refund of the tax is available when they are exported. This is obtained through the Tourist Refund Scheme (TRS) desk at your airport of departure. Please note, however, that most Australian shops serving tourists do provide a tax-free purchasing option on presentation of a valid passport and airline ticket. TRS does not apply in these cases.

ELECTRICITY

This plug has a grounding pin and two flat prongs forming a V-shape. There is an ungrounded version of this plug as well, with only two flat V-shaped prongs. Australia's standard plug/socket system is used in applications up to 10 amps. The electric supply in

Australia is 230 volts a.c. 50 Hz. You will need an adaptor to fit your plug into an Australian 3 pin socket. Adaptors are readily available at local stores and airports.

If your standard electric supply is 110 volts (North America/Japan), you will need an adaptor (which changes the shape of the plug) and a converter (which changes the voltage). Do not make the mistake of just using the adaptor unless the appliance you are using has a voltage switch on it.



EMERGENCY NUMBERS

In case of emergency, dial 000. This number connects to the ambulance, fire and police services. From analogue phones, 000 will connect callers, although many newer digital phones require the user to dial 112, the international standard emergency number. Consult your carrier if you are uncertain how to access the 000 emergency network.

Telephone Useful Tips

- The country code for Australia is 61. The city code for Sydney is 02. To telephone Sydney from an overseas country: International dialling code + 61 + 2 + Local Number.
- International Directory Inquiries is 1225. The International dialling code is 0011. For dialling to an overseas country from Sydney: 0011 + Country Code + Area Code + Local Number.

OPENING HOURS

Banks

Central branches of major banks have foreign exchange facilities. (Fees apply) Trading hours: Mon-Thurs 9.30am-4pm, Fri 9.30am-5pm. Limited Saturday services are available at some banks and building societies.

Department Stores

Generally, shops do not stay open late in Australia. Most major shopping centres are open from 9am to 5.30pm Monday through Friday and 9am to 8pm on Thursday or Friday; 9am to 5pm on Saturday, and 10am to 4pm on Sunday.

Post Offices

Post Offices are open from 9am-5pm on Monday to Friday. Some suburban post offices are open on Saturdays. Most large hotels will be able to assist you with any postal services you may require.

Supermarkets

The two main supermarket operators Woolworths and Coles generally trade between 6am and 12 midnight 7 days a week, although some inner-city stores in Sydney operate 24 hours a day.

Smoking

Smoking is not permitted within public buildings in Australia and is not permitted at all on public transport, including domestic air flights.

Tipping

Whilst a tip is not essential and you should not feel obliged, it is appreciated for good service. A 10% tip is widely accepted as the standard in restaurants. In a taxi, a tip of \$1-\$2 is usual.

No service charges are added to hotel and restaurant bills.

Sydney during January can tend to be hot and humid with average daily highs of 26° Celsius and average daily lows of 19° Celsius, however days above 35° Celsius are not

uncommon. Ultra-Violet radiation levels are higher in January than any other month of the year, so attendees are strongly advised to wear sun protection such as hats, sunscreen or clothing that covers arms and legs when going outside for extended periods. During January even periods of sun exposure as short at 10mins during midday can result in unpleasant sunburn.
